

The Hills Shire Council's "Fight for a Fairer Hills Future" campaign has drawn criticism for being more political theatre than constructive action. Rather than delivering critical infrastructure, Council appears to be diverting resources into a misleading and partisan campaign timed with the federal election and an upcoming state election. While infrastructure in The Hills Shire urgently needs attention, all levels of government must collaborate – not play blame games. The Hills Shire council had over a decade under the former Liberal State Government to address our local issues and now residents are paying a heavy price!

The campaign wrongly shifts responsibility for longstanding local issues onto a new state government. Many of Council's demands fall within its own jurisdiction – yet progress has stalled for years. Key intersections, parks, the Rouse Hill hospital and sports fields in high-growth areas like Box Hill remain incomplete despite promises stretching back over a decade. Residents of The Hills of Carmel still lack basic facilities, while Council's pace remains frustratingly slow.

In contrast, the Labor State Government is delivering new schools at:

- · The Gables
- · Box Hill High School
- Box Hill Public School, and Major Upgrades at:
 - · Rouse Hill High School
 - · Excelsior Public School
 - Castle Hill Public School
- Castle Hill Public School
- Matthew Pearce Public School (increased capacity from 647 to 1,200 students)



Meanwhile, residents report Council has spent significant public funds on campaign advertising, including targeted emails to library members – a misuse of resources and community trust. One Councillor who raised concerns was publicly attacked, showing how dissent is punished in this politicised environment.

Ultimately, this campaign distracts from the real work Council should be doing – delivering parks, roads, and community infrastructure. **Residents deserve action, not spin!**

It's time for The Hills Shire Council to stop gaslighting the community and start delivering on its core responsibilities.

Liberals Hold Mitchell Despite Significant Swing

Alex Hawke retains Mitchell

The 2025 Australian Federal Election in the Division of Mitchell, located in Sydney's north-west, marked a significant shift in the political landscape, with the Liberal Party experiencing a notable decline in support. Despite retaining the seat, the substantial swing against the Liberals reflects broader challenges facing the party both locally and nationally.

Incumbent Liberal MP Alex Hawke, who despite being a back bencher, was scarcely visible in the Hills at local & community events, successfully defended his seat in Mitchell; however, the victory was tempered by a considerable swing against him. With 82.5% of the vote counted, Hawke led by 8,589 votes, securing 60.69% of the two-candidate-preferred vote – a significant decrease from the previous election.



This nearly 8% swing away from the Liberals is particularly striking in a seat long considered a party stronghold. The redistribution prior to the election, which slightly reduced the Liberal margin from 10.7% to 10.5%, may have contributed to this shift.

Campaign Dynamics and Key Issues

The campaign in Mitchell was influenced by several factors contributing to the Liberal Party's diminished support:

- National Party Challenges: The Liberal Party faced internal criticism for its campaign strategies, including spending approximately \$1.5 million on polling that failed to predict the election outcome accurately.
- Policy Positions: Controversial policy announcements, such as proposed public service cuts, were perceived as alienating to voters, particularly in urban electorates like Mitchell.
- Demographic Changes: The electorate's evolving demographics, with increasing diversity and younger populations, may have contributed to shifting political preferences.

M Historical Context and Electoral Trends

Mitchell has been predominantly held by the Liberal Party since its creation in 1949, with only brief periods under Labor control. The recent swing against the Liberals, despite retaining the seat, indicates a potential erosion of the party's traditional base.

Implications for the Future

The results in Mitchell mirror a broader national trend of the Liberal Party losing ground in urban electorates. Former Liberal minister Christopher Pyne emphasised the need for the party to address internal issues, such as gender imbalance and divisive messaging, to reconnect with voters.

The significant swing in Mitchell serves as a warning sign for the Liberal Party, highlighting the necessity for introspection and strategic realignment to regain competitiveness in future elections.



Labor Wins Greenway With Increased Majority

The 2025 Australian Federal Election in the Division of Greenway, located in Sydney's western suburbs, reaffirmed its status as a Labor stronghold, with incumbent MP Michelle Rowland securing a decisive victory. This outcome reflects both her entrenched local support and the broader momentum of the Australian Labor Party (ALP) across New South Wales. With 84.2% of the vote counted, Michelle Rowland led by a substantial margin of 23,212 votes over her nearest rival, maintaining a commanding 61.53% share in the two-candidate-preferred count. 
The Best Interests of the Children




Factors considered include:

There's no one-size-fits-all. Common parenting schedules include week-on/week-off, alternating weekends with midweek visits, or one parent having primary care with the other seeing the child on holidays or special occasions.

These are the dreams of just a few children within our Hills Shire. With ambition, boldly spoken, even if the pronunciation is not quite right yet.

Every Tuesday afternoon in The Hills Shire when most kids are trekking their way home, a small group lingers in a classroom. They aren't staying back for homework help. They're here to learn something much harder: how to speak with purpose. Confidence. Clarity. Courage.

At the centre of this is local educator Priya Wani, a woman who understands the difference one little voice can make.



"I want to learn more like her..." Each child in this program has a different reason for joining.

For some, she says, "... my mum says that I need to get better at speaking in public and making better speeches."

I want to be good at speaking because I want to grow up to be a matheticin."

Another wants to improve what she's already good at: "I joined because I've always been a good public speaker but I can be better." She continues, "My mum is a very good public speaker and I want to learn more like her." "Because I like to do speeches and learn more speeches."

They aren't being told what to say, rather, they're learning how to say what they mean. They made me feel like I was more than my circumstances..." Priya's journey started far away from The Hills, in India. She grew up surrounded by structure, where education was seen not only as a priority, but as a pathway.

"From a young age, I was taught the value of learning and resilience," she says. But what shaped her most wasn't just the curriculum. It was the people around her.

"There were definitely a few key adults who made a difference-teachers, family members, and even community leaders...

They made me feel like I was more than my circumstances." She continued, "Growing up, I've experienced first-hand how much of an impact one caring, supportive adult can have on a child's self-worth and future...it's definitely has shaped the way I approach working with kids now..." It is that feeling that she now works to pass on. After moving to Sydney in her twenties, Priya found herself volunteering during university. Then, she taught children how to use computers, something that was popular and simple at the time, but the impact of that was anything but. "I watched them transform as they gained confidence and began to believe in themselves. That's when I knew I wasn't just helping them learn. I was helping them grow." "She always says, keep going and keep trying..."

That's how Alaina describes Priya. It's a small phrase but one that encapsulates everything about how Priya teaches.



Before each session, Priya takes the time to ask her students how they are feeling or if they have anything on their minds. "For them, I think those first moments set the tone for the session. They know that it's a safe palace where they can focus and engage without pressure" she notes.

Priya builds relationships where her students know they can express themselves without fear of judgement. Priya identified that, whilst academic success is important, emotional resilience and self-confidence and a sense of belonging is "just as crucial". Whether that be the structured activities, or even the informal conversations, Priya ensures they know that they not only know they are heard, but their feelings matter.

"There's a warmth and sense of belonging here that makes it easy to connect and feel valued..."

Although Priya doesn't live in the Hills, she spends most of her weeks here, and has so for nearly two-and-a-half decades, with her work centred in the Hills Shire local school community. "There's a warmth and sense of belonging [to the Hills Shire] that makes it easy to connect and feel valued" she blissfully recounted.

Such schools have become very familiar to Priya as they see her as a trusted figure who listens first and encourages students to speak with confidence and intention. It's clear the Hills Shire means something to her. "There's a warmth and sense of belonging here," she reflects. "It makes it easy to connect, to feel valued."

That connection runs deep. Priya speaks about the area with genuine affection: "People in the Hills genuinely want to see each other succeed." It's that spirit of encouragement, she says, that makes her work here so fulfilling.

"There's a shared understanding in this community," she explains, "a common belief in creating spaces where children feel supported, not just academically, but emotionally too." And it shows in the classrooms she teaches, where teachers and parents work side by side. "That kind of partnership really changes things for kids," she says.

Even though her home is not in this community, Priya's sense of belonging here is undeniable. "The families, the schools, the children...they've made me feel like this is my community too."

And as the sun starts to dip lower on the horizon of another Tuesday afternoon, the children begin to gather their things to be returned to OOSH to reunite with their parents. It's quick and routined but something lingers in the room...something more than a mere lesson or speech. It's the echo of giggles, the spark of innovation, and the undeniable energy of young voices learning to seize their own power.

Whilst today they are school students at a local Hills Shire school, tomorrow they will be artists, pilots and even "matheticin(s)". For these children, these are not only dreams today, but their, and our, futures, tomorrow. In the centre of it all stands Priya Wani quietly building a future where every child believes in the strength of their own voice for the betterment of them, the Hills Shire, and the world tomorrow.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands is a volunteer-driven charity based in South Windsor, New South Wales, providing vital support to individuals and families experiencing homelessness, food insecurity, or crisis. Founded in 2011 by eight-year-old Cassidy Strickland and her mother Linda after seeing a man searching for food in their bin, it has grown into a cornerstone of compassion in the Hawkesbury region.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands offers a range of services, including free weekend community meals, emergency food hampers, toiletries, clothing, sleeping bags, tents, and pet supplies. Their Drop-in Hub, open Wednesday to Friday from 8am to 1pm, provides showers, breakfast, internet access, and a welcoming space for connection. We're finally seeing the roads, hospitals, and services our community deserves. There's more to do - but together, we're building a better future.







A brief history

In 1996, the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation launched Australia's first National Reconciliation Week.

In 2001, Reconciliation Australia was established to continue to provide national leadership on reconciliation.

In the same year, approximately 300,000 people walked across Sydney Harbour Bridge as part of National Reconciliation Week-and subsequently across bridges in cities and towns-to show their support for reconciliation.

Today, National Reconciliation Week is celebrated in workplaces, schools and early learning services, community organisations and groups, and by individuals Australia-wide.



With plenty of entertainment available on free to air and streaming on Television... it is easy to sit back and let it all happen in our lounge rooms.....but I would like to advocate for the thrill of live performances!



Whether it is watching and listening to live music...pop, blues, jazz or classical or going to the ballet, the opera or especially live theatre.... there is nothing as exciting or even visceral as experiencing human talent when it exceeds the normal or humdrum. It is the tale of Florence Foster Jenkins, an elderly, rich, New York lady who truly believed she had a great operatic voice. This was not the opinion of many who heard her.... however, she continued to sing in public (badly!!) and gave a performance to 3000 people at Carnegie Hall in New York. The performance by Kate Mannix as Florence in the Pavilion production was outstanding, never overacted, a beautifully nuanced performance that nearly brought tears to your eyes at the end. Her supporting actors were also excellent...even the Mexican maid spoke in Spanish with a brilliant and rapid flair!

15 lenders cut home loan rates ahead of RBA meeting



Fifteen Australian lenders have trimmed their variable mortgage rates since the start of April, adding to the momentum created by the Reserve Bank's cash rate cut in February. The wave of reductions comes as competition intensifies in the lead-up to next week's RBA board meeting.

Although the precise impact of further rate cuts on housing prices remains uncertain, modelling by Centre for Independent Studies chief economist Peter Tulip suggests that a 1 percentage point cut could drive property prices up by around 6% within the first year.

According to Canstar's latest rate tracking, major banks and lenders that have introduced new variable rates since April 1 include Commonwealth Bank, Westpac, Bank of Queensland, Newcastle Permanent, Greater Bank, AMP Bank, Aussie, Bank of China, Bank of Melbourne, BankSA, BankVic, Defence Bank, Macquarie Bank, St.George, and Summerland Bank.

Currently, the lowest advertised variable rate sits at 5.59%, with 35 lenders now offering at least one variable rate below 5.75%. By Tuesday's RBA meeting, Canstar predicts that over 30 lenders could advertise variable rates under 5.50%, with the most competitive potentially dipping below 5.40%. Meanwhile, the average existing owner-occupier variable rate may drop to 5.81%.

What It Could Mean for House Prices

Should the RBA deliver a further three rate cuts by the end of 2025 — as some economists anticipate property prices across major cities could see substantial increases. Based on Tulip's model, projected median price rises include:

Sydney: +\$87,600 → \$1,547,600 Brisbane: +\$55,200 → \$975,200 Adelaide: +\$49,620 → \$876,620 Hobart: $+$42,300 \rightarrow $747,300$ ACT: $+$57,480 \rightarrow $1,015,480$ Darwin: +\$34,200 → \$604,200

These forecasts underline the potential ripple effect of monetary policy on the housing market, as falling rates fuel buyer demand and lift property values nationwide.



A new era in stability and security for renters has been introduced with three key changes coming into force as a result of the Minns Labor's Government's reforms to make renting fairer in NSW.

Delivering on a key election commitment to the state's 2.3 million renters, the following legislation comes into force:

- Ending of no-grounds evictions owners will now be required to provide a valid reason to end all lease types, set out in legislation, increasing security and transparency for renters. Longer notice periods will apply for some leases, giving renters greater certainty and time to find a new home, while ensuring investors can still effectively manage their properties. Renters who find a new property after receiving an evictions notice will also have improved rights to end a lease early.
- Pets in rentals tenants will be able to apply to keep a pet in their rental home, with owners only able to refuse for specific
 reasons, such as the owner living at the property or failure to comply with local council laws. A standard application form and
 process has been developed to make the system clearer and more efficient for both renters and owners. Approval will be automatic
 if owners do not respond to pet applications within 21 days.
- Fee-free ways to pay rent owners and agents must enable renters to pay their rent using certain fee-free rent payment methods such as direct bank transfer, ensuring there are convenient and modern payment methods available without extra cost.

These important changes come alongside other key initiatives from the Minns Labor Government:

- Limiting rent increases to once per year Rent increases are limited to once per year across all lease types including fixed-term and periodic leases.
- Ending tenants having to pay for their own background checks Clarifying that rental applicants can't be charged fees before
 entering a tenancy, for example costs for background checks.
- Portable Rental Bonds Scheme The Minns Labor Government is investing \$6.6 million to develop and deliver the nation's first Portable Rental Bonds Scheme. This means eligible renters can move homes and digitally transfer their existing bond with them. The scheme is expected to be up and running by the end of the year.
- Rent Check A new, free website Rent Check helps renters to understand how the rent they're being asked to pay compares to
 other similar homes.

Penalties are now in place for agents or owners who do the wrong thing, with the changes to be enforced by the Minns Labor Government's Rental Taskforce, with inspectors and support teams to help renters and act on serious breaches of rental laws. People are encouraged to visit the NSW Fair Trading website for clear, up-to-date guidance on the new rental laws and their rights and obligations here:

These important changes ensure that the rights between renters and owners is balanced, and the rental system in NSW is fairer.


